Experiences with food:




- My parents continued to eat traditional Bengali food while my brothers and got got more used to American food.

- My parents would make their lunch with traditional recipes and take it to work.

Struggles of my Parents



- People are not as connected and close to their neighbors.
- Families and friends keep to themselves.
- Everyone follows their own schedule.
- No servants to make their life easier.



"Some differences in growing up in America instead of Bangladesh would be things that are normalized in both environments. For instance, in Bangladesh, my parents would always be close and connected to people around them in their neighborhood while in America, you can't find that same connectivity. I believe Bengalis stay in contact as much as possible because it's a norm and in America, it's usually we are more independent. You wouldn't find many people giving you the time of day as much as you would back in Bangladesh, even inside families. However, living in America, I believe you are more easily accepted for whoever you are..."
