What is culture?

What is a cross cultural experience

- A culturally diverse encounter is one where at least two distinct societies are united. Cross cultural experience allows people of different backgrounds to learn from each other.
- One effect of such instances is the acceptance of cultures. People will start to pick up on certain cultural traits and identify by them. Such as clothing, customs, traditions, laws, rules.
- In a cross-cultural experience people will want to learn and ask questions about the others language, religion, day to day life, etc.





My Cultural Values

- I am from Montenegro, but I was born in New York. My parents immigrated to the United States at separate times. My father came thirty years ago, and my mother came twenty-five years ago. While living in America they have learned many new things, like learning English; but their Montenegrin traditions and values have never gone away.
- Some of my cultural values are:
 - Making Turkish coffee when people arrive.
 - Being respectful and obedient to older people.
 - Helping in the kitchen.
 - Dancing and listening to music.



Traditions

- There are many different traditions in a Montenegrin culture. In marriage, the women have a bridal shower called "Kana" this is when her side of the family hosts a party and showers her with gifts to celebrate her as a bride.
- Another tradition is when the couple gets married. Each side of the family must go to each others' homes and meet each other. When they have these events, they each bring gifts for one another.
- For example, when my cousin got married her fiancé brought her perfume, a purse, shoes, etc.





Food

- Food is a very important thing in our culture.
- Whenever Montenegrin people go out for dinner, they order large amounts of food to feed the whole town.
- We cannot eat pork since it is against our religion
- Whenever someone cooks in the family, we always invite each other to come over and have a meal.
- Some meals that are common are plasma cookies with milk as a late-night snack. This was a very common meal for me when I was in Montenegro.
- Burek with spinach, cheese, ground beef, potatoes.
- Cevape with pita bread, Ivar, lettuce, etc.



My family


- In my family, we are very close. We always see each other on the weekends because we work throughout the week.
- When there is a new baby in the family, each of us would have to go to that person's home and bring gifts and money to celebrate the baby.
- We always have dinners every weekend and have food such as burke, cevape. These foods are part of our culture. Whenever we are sitting around the table, the oldest sit at the end and the youngest in the middle. The kids and young adults are serving the older people as a sign of respect.
- For example, my father when he is sitting, it is rare for him to get up for dinner because people always ask him if he needs anything





Language

- Although I was born and raised in New York.
 Croatian was my first language. My parents
 both speak the language, and, in our
 household, we don't speak English. I was
 taught English as my second language.
- It is very common in a Montenegrin household for families to teach their children the native language instead of English. For example, my sister just had a baby last year and we only speak Croatian to him so that he can adapt to our culture first. One reason why our culture does this is so that the child can feel connected to their roots.



Beliefs/Religion

In our Montenegrin culture we practice Islam.

Another thing we do each year is fasting. It is the holy month of fasting. This is called Ramadan.


